Critical Accomplishments from 2022





What has the Coalition for Farmland Preservation accomplished this past year?

As rapid development continues across Arizona, and Maricopa County was recently announced by American Farmland Trust as the number one county in the nation for loss of farmland, the Coalition for Farmland Preservation has doubled down on advocacy work, public outreach, and most importantly- preserving our farms!

The Coalition also formed transformative partnerships to collaborate on funding opportunities, as this past year saw historic investment from the federal government on strengthening local and regional food system infrastructure. And, because solutions begin at the community level, the Coalition partnered with local cities, grassroots organizations, summits, and initiatives to leverage innovative ways to build a truly resilient and equitable localized food system.

Public Awareness & Outreach



Created the Coalition's first Quarterly Newsletter Series with an average open rate of 50% and an increase of 70 new subscribers in 2022



Collaborated on developing a revamped Good Food Finder online food resource hub—the Farmland Preservation landing page was the 5th most visited page with over 3.000 views in 2022



Featured in ABC15's investigative news report on housing developments pushing out farmers to educate the public on the importance of coordinating urban growth with rural agricultural communities to preventing a deep rural and urban divide



Advocacy

- Delivered 12 presentations to universities, organizations, and diverse stakeholders on the importance of preserving farmland and building localized food systems
- Presented on the role of Adaptive Agriculture to food system advocates at the 2022 AZ Food Summit
- Worked with urban planners, Coalition Working Group members, and other organizations on updating five municipal General Plans to integrate urban agriculture into its framework

Farmer & Farmland Support

- Preserved 3.3. acres of Maya's Farm in a conservation easement—the first
 urban ag easement accomplished in Arizona through a collaboration
 with City of Phoenix, Central Arizona Land Trust, the landowner,
 farmer Maya Dailey, and other partners
- Fostered collaborations among producers, such as
 Oatman Flats Ranch & Heartquist Hollow Family Farm
 on incorporating livestock as part of a <u>regenerative</u>
 sheep grazing project
- Provided a \$25,000 micro-grant to assist a Cochise County farmer for infrastructure repairs



Funding

Secured a partnership with American Farmland Trust in the Southwest region and selected as a land navigator partner organization for their USDA Grant Proposal "On Solid Ground: Enabling a New Generation to Access Land and Thrive in Agriculture," pending award announcement

Partnered on two recently awarded USDA "Partnerships for Climate-Smart
Commodities" grant projects focused on supporting local producers with implementing investments in soil health and climate-smart practices, and marketing climate-smart and desert-adapted crops

Connected producers and nonprofits to Local First Arizona's Economic Development Recovery Center services that assist with federal, state, municipal, or foundation grants applications at no cost; five food & farming related organizations were awarded grants in 2022 with over \$285,000 in funding
